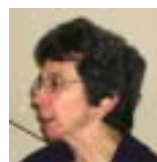

further explore them and find a way to respond to them more effectively and more in keeping with the reality of each milieu. From this sharing, questions arose concerning the effectiveness of "Just News". Is this newsletter meeting its goal, which is to be a training and information tool? Is it readily available to all sisters now that it can be accessed only from the website? (cf.: survey)

In addition, each province was free to choose a second theme relevant to its reality and its needs. In local houses and at the provincial level, among both the SSA and the people they are in contact with, the theme of the environment definitely struck a chord, resulting in decisions based on the seriousness of the situation – such as recycling at the Motherhouse, community actions and small, concrete personal efforts, an awareness campaign, etc. This wide range of efforts prove once again that the SSA are not indifferent to the major problems of the world today.

As anticipated, most of the agenda for Friday and Saturday was devoted to discerning how the Social Justice Office should be organized. The "seeing" aspect had been done by an ad hoc committee which explained to Network members the three scenarios sent to them for study. The "judging" aspect developed as discernment continued: prayer times, listening to one another, discussion, personal reflection, clarification questions, personal investment, etc. We brought everything to the Eucharist that closed the day.

This first plenary session encouraged us to review the provinces' expectations in order to

To allow a resolution to emerge from the previous days' discernment, the program for Sunday called for quiet reflection.

First we welcomed Norman Lévesque, a meteorologist, who spoke to us for an hour and a half about climate change and its negative impact. The participants were impressed with



this young academic who seemed to be very comfortable with both faith and science. With discernment and most appropriately, he prefaced his brief talk with a Bible passage that he wanted us to consider. A

witness that did not go unnoticed!

Until noon, Mr. Lévesque yielded his place to Haitian-born Marlène Rateau, who had been in Quebec for a number of years and was a member of the "Concertation pour Haïti", an organization focused on Haiti and its needs. Her love for the land of her birth, her objectivity and her commitment to work for the Haitian cause made her both a credible speaker and an interesting person to converse with. Ms. Rateau ended by assuring us that at the end of March, different organizations dedicated to defending Haiti would be deciding on concrete action. She hoped that all SSA would get behind this action in solidarity. To be continued!

Sunday afternoon, Sisters Marlène Gérard and Rachel Agnes Bushey joined the group. They came to hear Sr. Rita Larivée present the toolkit prepared by



UNANIMA International to facilitate leading an anti-demand campaign (i.e., against trafficking for the purpose of sexual exploitation). Rita brought some files to the meeting and distributed them to Network members, who read them with great interest. Did you know that the SSA helped support the production of these materials?

The Network will make good use of these materials when it joins in the international campaign mounted by all religious communities in fall 2008. This theme is certainly likely to be integrated into the orientations for the upcoming general chapter.

The evening of Sunday, February 24, and all day on the 25th, the members of the Network gathered to continue the discernment begun during the first few days. Introduced by the rhythm of the mantra to the Holy Spirit, the periods of listening and discussion culminated in a consensus of all participants that was to be presented by Sister Denise and Diane Boudreault to the members of the General Commission on Monday, March 10.

Network members took advantage of this final meeting to pay tribute to the staff of the Social Justice Office, inspired by Paul's letter to the Philippians: "We thank our God every time we remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of our prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now." (Philippians 1:3-7) To show their gratitude to Denise and Diane, they gave each woman a special blessing. "May our God be for you the source of your joy, for as long as your pilgrimage shall last!"

The session ended with a rite of dismissal rooted in the orientation for the general chapter of 1992: "Gospel women, let us dare to live a prophetic presence..."
